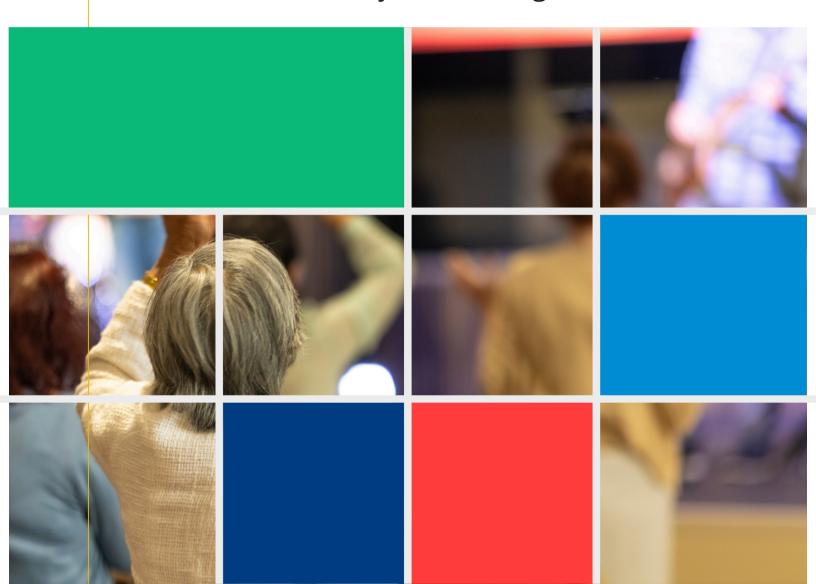
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INTRODUCTION

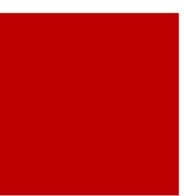

As we reflect on the past year and look ahead, we reaffirm our commitment to fostering a worship culture that is deeply personal yet collectively powerful. Worship is not just something we do—it is who we are. Let us continue to live lives of worship, in spirit and in truth, so that God may be glorified in all we do.



""Creative Brand Strategy" is jargon for online appeal. At first glance, the term "online appeal" may seem to be anti-ministry, a cold and calculated projection of our intended perception of the church. At Warden Full Gospel Assembly, "Creative Brand Strategy" is contrary to its assumed function. While it does aim to project a powerful and calculated view of our church to encourage outsiders in the surrounding community to take steps toward calling Warden home, it is also very much a form of ministry work. The goal of branding and maintaining an online presence in an increasingly online world is to stretch beyond the weekly Sunday Service and to meet our congregants and anyone who has ears to hear throughout the week.

Each week has 168 hours. For most churches, roughly two of those hours is dedicated to an in-person service. That leaves 166 hours beyond in-person gathering. Creative Brand Strategy allows us to engage, encourage and exhort beyond in-person gatherings. To that end, the year 2024 consisted of graphics designed, Biblical messages shared, Sermons condensed and published for the world to hear and believe - content created to reach you and to reach beyond our church.

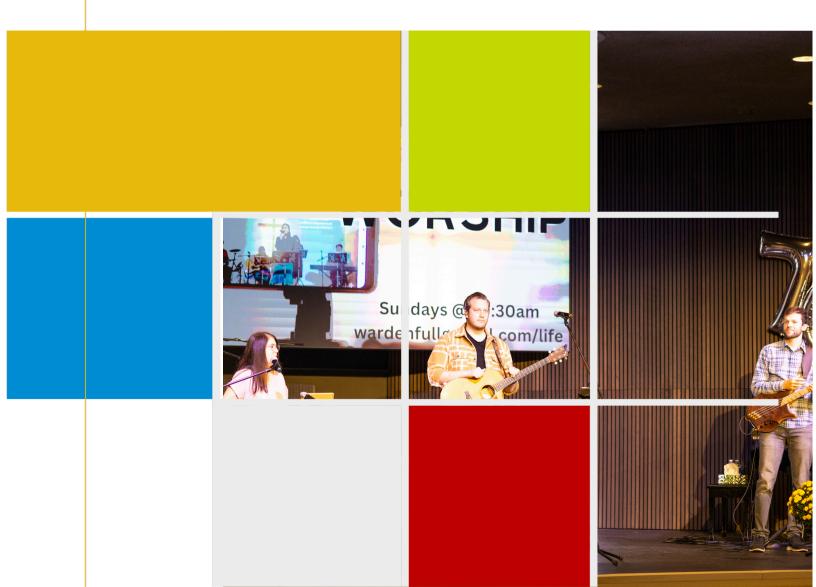
"Those we connected with online most enjoyed Interactive posts regarding our Sunday invites, Sermon Reels (condensed clips of the heart of a Sunday message), images of the faces of our church, fun and lighthearted content and our rebranded devotional, "Reel Life". Throughout the year, we measured our success online using metrics (social media data). It is important to note when looking at metrics that heaven rejoices at the salvation of one soul, and yet there are also Biblical records of mass numbers coming to know the Lord at varying points in its narrative.

There is a guiding principle for online presence there. Reaching even one person is significant; one life matters. Yet we also rejoice when many come to depend on Jesus. There is a balance of holding the one and seeking the many. In 2024, we grew offline and online! From October to December, we have reached 2.6K people on Instagram, had 30.3K Views, and 759 interactions. On Facebook, we have reached 2.8K people, had 18.5K views and 316 interactions. Altogether, we gained 30 followers between the two platforms from October to December.

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INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Members Warden Full Gospel Assembly SCARBOROUGH Ontario

Qualified Opinion

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Warden Full Gospel Assembly which comprise the statement of financial position as at December 31, 2024 and the statement of operations and changes in fund balances, statement of cash flows and schedule of expenses for the year then ended and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In our opinion, except for the effects of the matter described in the Basis for Qualified Opinion paragraph, the accompanying financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the entity as at December 31, 2024 and the results of its operations and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.

Basis for Qualified Opinion

In common with many not-for-profit organizations, Warden Full Gospel Assemblyderivespart of its revenuesfrom the general public in the form of contributions, the completeness of which are not susceptible to complete audit verification. Accordingly, verification of revenue from this source was limited to the amounts recorded in the records of Warden Full Gospel Assembly. Therefore, we were not able to determine whether any adjustments might be necessary to contributions revenue, the excess of revenues over expenses, and cash flows from operations for the yearsended December31, 2024 and 2023, current assetsas at December 31, 2024 and 2023 and fund balances as at January 1 and December 31 for both the 2024 and 2023 years.

The audit opinion on the financial statements for the year ended December 31, 2023 was modified accordingly because of the possible effects of this limitation in scope.

We conducted our audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are independent of the entity in accordance with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements in Canada, and we have fulfilled our other responsibilities in accordance with these requirements. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our qualified opinion.

Responsibilities of Management and Those Charged with Governance for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance
with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations and for such internal control as management
determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material
misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessingthe entity's ability to continue asa going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the entity or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

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Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the entity's financial reporting process.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standardswill alwaysdetect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards, we exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit. We also:

• Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.

Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control.

- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by management.
- Conclude on the appropriateness of management's use of the going concern basis of accounting and, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the entity's ability to continue as a going concern. If we conclude that a material uncertainty exists, we are required to draw attention in our auditor's report to the related disclosures in the financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify our opinion. Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of our auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the entity to cease to continue as a going concern.
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

We communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that we identify during our audit.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

DECEMBER 31, 2024

NATURE OF OPERATIONS Warden Full Gospel Assembly (the "Church") is a Christian Church in the

Greater Toronto area affiliated

with the Pentecostal Assemblies of Canada, providing worship services and Biblical instruction to people of all ages.

The Church was incorporated under the Canada Not-for-profit Corporations Act on January 27, 2020. The Church is a registered charity under the Canadian Income Tax Act and accordingly is exempt from income taxes.

1. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations and include the following significant accounting policies:

a)Fund Accounting

Resources are classified into funds according to the activities or objectives specified as follows:

i) General Fund

The General Fund receives unrestricted contributions and is responsible for the general operations of the Church and its various ministries.

ii) Legacy Fund

The Legacy Fund was created by the Church Board in 2000 to undertake visionary projects to build God's Kingdom. 5% of the general fund receipts are transferred to the Legacy Fund. Other contributions to this fund consist of specific contributions or bequests from individuals.

iii)Capital Fund

The Capital Fund records the capital activities relating to the capital assets at 2210 Warden Avenue and a camp cottage held by the Church.

b)Revenue Recognition

The Church follows the restricted fund method of accounting for contributions. Externally restricted contributions are recognized as revenue in the fund corresponding to the purpose for which they were contributed. Unrestricted contributions are recognized as revenue in the Operating Fund. Restricted contributions for which there is no fund are accounted for using the deferral method.

Revenue for ministry programs is recognized in the period in which the program takes place. Investment and rental revenue are recognized when earned.



NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

DECEMBER 31, 2024

1. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES - Continued

c)Contributed Services

Volunteers contribute significant hours per year to assist the Church in carrying out its activities. Because of the difficulty of determining their fair value, contributed services are not recognized in the financial statements.

d)Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for notfor-profit organizations requires management to make estimates and assumptions based on currently available information. Such estimates and assumptions affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities as at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the year. Actual results could differ from the estimates used.

Significant estimates include the estimated useful life of capital assets.

e) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents consist of cash held in the Church's bank accounts and money market funds in an Edward Jones investment account.

f) Investments

Marketable Securities

Marketable securities, which are investments traded in an active market, are measured at fair value.

g)Capital Assets

Capital assets are recorded at cost. Amortization is being provided over the estimated useful life of the assets using the following annual rates and methods:

h)Impairment of Capital Assets

When tangible capital asset no longer contributes to an organization's ability to provide goods and services, or the value of future economic benefits or service potential associated with the tangible capital asset is less than its net carrying amount, the net carrying amount of the tangible capital asset is written down to the asset's fair value or replacement cost.

i) Financial Instruments

Measurement of Financial Instruments

The Church initially measures its financial assets and financial liabilities originated or exchanged in arm's length transactions at fair value.

Financial assets and financial liabilities originated or exchanged in related party transactions, except for those that involve parties whose sole relationship with the organization is in the capacity of management, are initially measured at cost.

The Church subsequently measures all of its financial assets and liabilities at cost or amortized cost, except for investments in equity instruments that are quoted in an active market, which are measured at fair value. Changes in fair value are recognized in the excess of revenues over expenses in the period incurred.

Financial assets subsequently measured at amortized cost include cash, fixed income GIC's and contributions receivable. Financial liabilities subsequently measured at amortized cost include accounts payable and accrued liabilities.

Other than marketable securities, the Church has no financial assets measured at fair value and has not elected to carry any financial asset or liability at fair value.

Impairment

Financial assets measured at amortized cost are tested for impairment when events or circumstances indicate possible impairment. Write-downs, if any, are recognized in excess of revenues over expenses and may be subsequently reversed to the extent that the net effect after the reversal is the same as if there had been no write-down. There are no impairment indicators in the current year.

4. RELATED PARTY BALANCES AND TRANSACTIONS

Cleaning services totaling \$36,462 for the year (2023 - \$28,308) were provided by a director. Worship service costs totaling \$Nil (2023 - \$1,500) for the year were provided by a director. These transactions were conducted in the normal course of operations and were measured at the exchange amount which is the amount agreed upon by the related parties. At year-end, \$4,424 (2023 - \$2,921) is payable to the director for cleaning services.

On December 13, 2021, Auxano Development Corporation was incorporated as a private corporation with the Lead Pastor of the Church as the sole director. In 2022, the director was replaced by a director of the Church Board and additional directors were added in 2023. The purpose of this corporation is for real estate development for the benefit of the Church. During the year, the Church paid legal fees associated with the project of \$Nil (2023 - \$7,338) which were intended to be recovered from the proceeds of the project. However, as of the date of the financial statement, the project has ceased, and these costs have been expensed in professional fees.

8. FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

Risks and Concentrations

The Church is exposed to various risks through its financial instruments. The following analysis provides a summary of the Church's exposure to and concentrations of risk at December 31, 2024:

a) Credit Risk

Credit risk is the risk that one party to a financial instrument will cause financial loss for the other party by failing to discharge an obligation. The Church is not exposed to significant credit risk. There has been no change in the assessment of credit risk from the prior year.

b) Liquidity Risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Church will encounter difficulty in meeting obligations associated with financial liabilities. The Church is exposed to this risk mainly with respect to its accounts payable and accrued liabilities. The Church manages this risk by managing its working capital and by generating sufficient cash flow from operations. There has been no change in the assessment of liquidity risk from the prior year.

8. FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS - Continued c)

Market Risk

Market risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market prices. Market risk comprises three types of risk: currency risk, interest rate risk, and price risk. The Church is mainly exposed to interest rate risk and price risk as follows:

i) Interest Rate Risk

Interest rate risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market interest rates. As described in Note 2, the Church redeemed the interest bearing investments during the year. The exposure to this risk fluctuates as the investments and related interest rates change from year to year.

ii) Price Risk

Price risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market prices (other than those arising from interest rate risk or currency risk), whether those changes are caused by factors specific to the individual instrument or its issuer, or factors affecting all similar financial instruments traded in the market. The Church is exposed to price risk through its investments in marketable securities held in mutual funds. The exposure to this risk fluctuates as the Church's investments change from year to year.

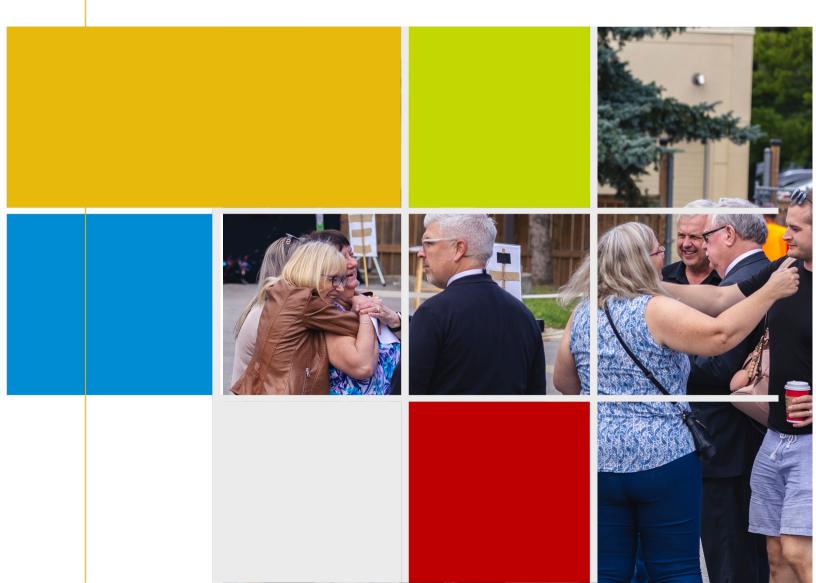
